Root Words Activity—Mobile

Today your group will create a mobile for the root word you were assigned.

- 1. Get a piece of cardstock and some string to use for your mobile.
- 2. Have a group member (or two) look up some words in the dictionary that contain that root word. Don't forget to read the definition!
- 3. Another group member can start creating the mobile. You may use a square, rectangle, or circle shape. Size it so that you can get 4 shapes from one piece of cardstock. I have some circle makers. If you'd like to use one, just ask.
- 4. Write the root word on one of the shapes in a way that is easy to read (it will be hanging up in the classroom).
- 5. Write the meaning of the root word on another piece of the mobile.
- 6. Write at least 3 words that contain the root word on the third piece of the mobile (check with your dictionary person for these words). Make sure you spell them correctly!
- 7. Draw pictures, symbols, etc. as visual reminders of what the root word means on the last piece of cardstock.
- 8. Use a hole punch to make holes in the mobile for tying the string; or use tape.
- 9. Make sure all group members' names are somewhere on the mobile.
- 10. You will explain your root word to the class, including the example words you found (so know what they mean!).
